HISTORY

The Uwharrie Society was founded in 1994 by a small group of United Way donors who felt that Leadership Giving offered donors an opportunity to become more effectively involved in strengthening our community through United Way. Together, they launched The Uwharrie Society to encourage and recognize leadership level gifts of \$1000 or more. Forty-eight families accepted the invitation to join as Founding Members.

In 1998, The Uwharrie Society expanded to include The Uwharrie Chapter of The Alexis de Tocqueville Society, which represents the highest level of giving to United Way nationwide. It was created by United Way of America to recognize exceptional gifts of \$10,000 or more.

Through the years, The Uwharrie Society has grown exponentially to include approximately 200 members each year, and has contributed over \$10.5 million dollars for United Way programs and services in Randolph County. This year, we celebrate The Uwharrie Society's 29th Anniversary Campaign, continuing the proud tradition of caring begun by United Way in 1956.

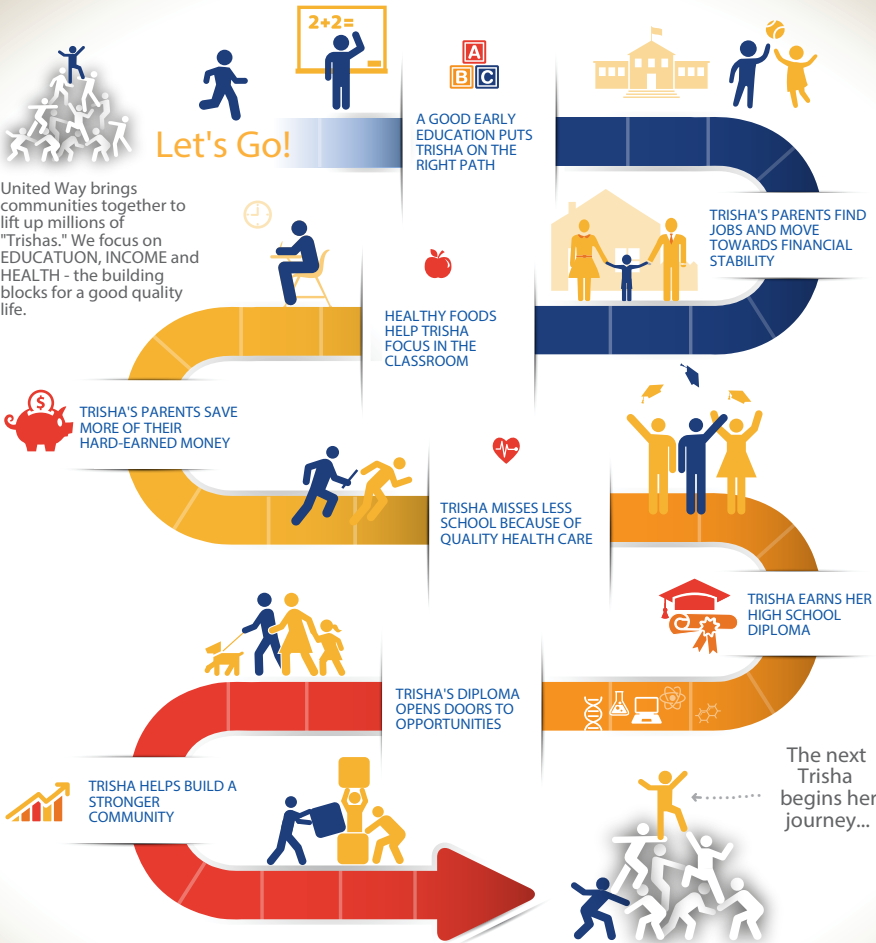

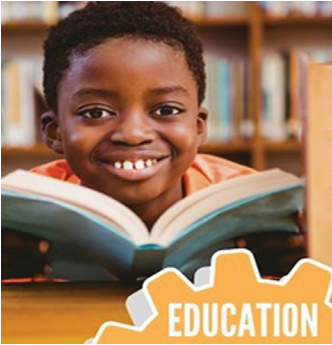

FOCUSING ON EDUCATION

EDUCATION is a cornerstone of success in school, work, and opportunities for a better life.



Ensuring children

- Start school ready to learn
- Read at grade level early on
- Succeed in middle grades
- Graduate from high school ready for college or careers

- **Central Boys and Girls Club** offers nearly **230 students**, ages 6-18, after school mentoring, homework assistance, tutoring, and technology assistance.
- Nearly **700 students** depended on the **BackPack Pals** program for food over the weekend, and **354** received the caring support of mentors.
- **432 students** applied their STEM skills in **4-H** science and agriculture programs.
- **Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts** helped **678 students** learn life skills, leadership, environmental stewardship, and self-reliance.
- **The Partnership for Children's** focus on quality child-care, school readiness, and early literacy served **376 children** from birth through age 5.

HELPING CHILDREN SUCCEED

FINDING HIS HERO



Thanks to Communities in Schools, Thomas found the hero he needed in Tom Holtham.

His father had died, and his kindergarten teacher felt Thomas needed the influence of a mentor he could relate to.

Caring people like you make it possible for United Way to fund CIS and other programs that focus on nurturing children from cradle to career. Thank you for your support.

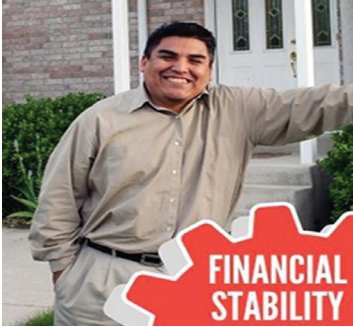

FINANCIALLY STABLE people are more likely to have access to quality health care, provide a good education for their children, and contribute to their local economies.

● **10,696 people** turned to **CUOC's Crisis Intervention Services** for assistance last year.

● **The American Red Cross Disaster Services** helped **40 families** put their lives back together again after a fire.

● **The Salvation Army's Financial Crisis Program** helped **13,827 people** avoid eviction or losing their electricity and water services.

● **Path of Hope's Alpha/Mangum Houses** provided a safe, secure residential environment where people recovering from addiction could continue their recovery process and prepare to live independently again.

BUILDING STABLE FAMILIES

MAKING HER HOUSE SAFE AGAIN



At CUOC, Leslie received the help she desperately needed to make her house habitable again.

Leslie lived alone and was disabled. She had not had running water for two weeks, and she could barely pay her bills, so there were no funds for a plumber. She reached out to CUOC for help.

The problem turned out to be more than Leslie realized. In addition to repairs on the well pump and line, her septic tank was backed up into some lines, posing a serious health threat. It was also determined that it would be pointless to repair the well unless there was a new well house to keep pipes and the pump from freezing up.

CUOC's crisis intervention service was able to partner with Neighbors Helping Neighbors and other community resources to make the necessary repairs and to build a new well house so her home was safe to live in again. Thank you for your support.

When people are **HEALTHY**, active, and in a safe environment, they are more likely to succeed in school, work, and life.



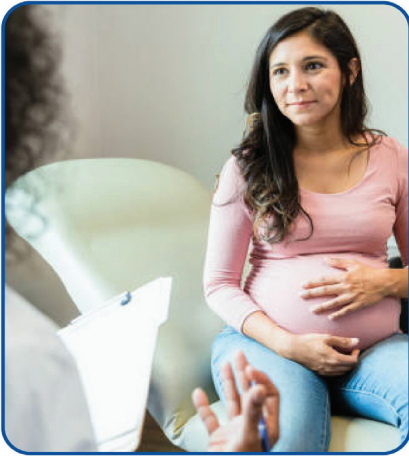
Improving access to

- **1649 second graders** in **CARE** classes across Randolph County learned how to recognize and report sexual abuse.
- **Kintegra Health** provided prenatal lab screenings for **50** uninsured or underserved patients.
- **In-home care from RCS** enabled **85 Seniors** to continue living independently in their own homes.
- **YMCA scholarships** helped **233 people** improve their health through fitness activities and classes.
- **Randolph Senior Adults Association** served **3628 people** with meals, transportation, Medicare options counseling, or respite adult day care.

A HEALTHY PREGNANCY



Thanks to United Way donors, she received the prenatal care she needed to protect her own and her unborn child's health.

She was in a tough situation, with an abusive partner and a surprise pregnancy. Finances were tight. She had legal fees for action against her partner, and an unplanned pregnancy created additional financial strain.

Being able to get prenatal screenings at Kintegra and have her diagnostic lab-work covered was a huge relief, and helped ensure a healthy pregnancy.
