





We Believe Every Young Person Deserves the Opportunity to Thrive



United Way Supports

- · Quality childcare and early childhood education
- Essential literacy skills
- After school and summer enrichment opportunities
- · College and career readiness
- · Family engagement
- Central Boys and Girls Club offers after school mentoring, homework assistance, tutoring and technology assistance for nearly 200 students, ages 6-18.
- Over 750 students depend on the BackPack Pals program for food over the weekend, and another 450 students receive the caring support of mentors.
- 9657 Students across Randolph County put their STEM skills to practical use in 4-H science and agriculture programs.
- Boy Scouts helps over 200 local boys learn valuable life skills, leadership, environmental stewardship, and self-reliance.
- The Partnership for Children serves close to 400 children, from birth through age 5, with quality child care, school readiness, and early literacy programs.

Nyla is a 4th grader who receives three hours of support weekly from a certified teacher during **Power Hour** at the **Boys and Girls Club**.

Nyla was several grades behind in reading, but thanks to **Power Hour** after-school homework assistance at the **Boys and Girls Club** she has made amazing progress and is on track to read at grade level by the end of this year.

United Way Improves Access To

- Healthy foods
- Safe opportunities for physical and social activity
- Quality health care
- Services that help our elderly remain active, independent, and safe
- Over 1500 second graders across Randolph County learn how to recognize and report sexual abuse in their CARE classes.
- Kintegra Health provides prenatal labs and diagnostic diabetic lab screenings for 250 uninsured or underserved patients.
- Thanks to in-home care from Regional Consolidated Services, 90 senior citizens can continue
 living independently in their own homes.
- YMCA scholarships help 298 people improve their health through fitness activities and classes.
- The meals, transportation, Medicare options counseling, and respite adult day care services at Randolph Senior Adults Association offer a better quality of life for 4066 people and their families.

After a few falls down the outside steps, they knew it wasn't safe to try to leave the house, even for doctor appointments or groceries.

Regional Consolidated Services home repair service installed a ramp for their home, and it was a game changer. They knew they could once again leave home safely, and continue to be more mobile and independent.



Community Resiliency

We believe communities that are prepared for emergencies can build a secure future.



United Way Services Step In With

- Help and hope
- Crisis hotlines and support
- Disaster relief and recovery
- The American Red Cross Disaster Team provides disaster victims with emergency food, shelter, clothing, and medicines, and refers them to other community partners to guide them through the months-long recovery process.
- As well as responding to medical emergencies and automobile accidents, Ash-Rand Rescue & EMS
 personnel are certified in wilderness, swift-water, industrial, and high or low-angle rescue.
- NC 211 Crisis hotline offers free and confidential local information on emergency counseling, disaster assistance, food, health care, insurance, stable housing, employment services, veterans services, and family services.



The Ash-Rand swift-water rescue team was a welcome sight to the three men stranded on a cartop in raging floodwaters.

The Ash-Rand team reached the victims, helped them into life jackets and the rescue boat, and hauled them back to shore where waiting EMS crews warmed and evaluated the three.

Your United Way dollars help provide Ash-Rand Rescue with the equipment, training, and manpower to be one of the few certified swift water rescue teams in the state.

United Way Helps People Gain

- Knowledge and tools to manage income and savings
- Skills and education for good-paying jobs that can sustain a family
 - Security through home ownership
- Christians United Outreach Center Crisis Intervention Services provides short-term crisis
 assistance for over 11,000 people each year, with food, clothing, rent, utility payments, and
 other basic needs, and offers classes that help clients learn to budget and manage their money.
- Nearly 2000 people visit The Salvation Army Financial Crisis Program yearly for guidance and help to avoid eviction or losing their electricity or water services.



Sandra's house was beyond repair. CUOC helped her secure housing in a senior-living apartment, and helped with utility bills, medications, and food.

She obtained permanent, livable housing, and gained a greater understanding of budgeting her money.
